Families helped us with more weeding, pruning, invasive plant removal, and the creation of a new bed area. We planted radish seeds along the edge of the new bed. Radishes have a short growing season so we hope that some will be ripe by late fall. Families also harvested tomatoes, peppers and more to bring home and enjoy.

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
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
