A Fruit is a Suitcase for a Seed

We know that seeds turn into plants when we give it lots of sunlight, soil, water, and love, but where do seeds come from? To investigate this mystery, we came together to read, A Fruit is a Suitcase for Seeds, by Jean Richards. We learned that seeds don't just magically appear in a seed packet, but that they come from the fruits and vegetables that they grow! Putting our detective skills to use, we cut up a cucumber and some beans to remove each seed from its protective coating. We left the seeds soak in water overnight to separate from their gelatinous coating before rinsing them off and setting them out to dry. Now we have an endless supply of cucumber and bean seeds to plant in the spring!
